From Occupy Nigeria Movement in 2012 to #EndSARS Protest in 2020, Nigerian youth and their popular art practices are increasingly shaping the course of social and political events through performance, providing the participants with the language and actions necessary to renegotiate their place in society. Across the continent, popular performance arts are also constituting an essential means of knowledge production and forging a new sense of political and cultural identities among the youth. By constructing a repertoire of personal stories and local histories, these practices and movements centralize the body and the living realities as essential sites for decolonial politics, and they demand alternative frameworks for interpreting citizenship and publicness in Africa today.

Echoing the theme of 2023 LSA “Rethinking Decoloniality: African Decolonization and Epistemologies in the 21st Century”, the workshop aims to understand how popular art practitioners in the urban margins interrupt the institutional norms of pedagogical approaches and interrogate the hierarchies of knowledge production. Inspired by the approaches of the Bariga artists who navigate between the streets and the stages, we encourage in-depth dialogues and interactions between art practitioners and art scholars. In particular, we suggest a special off-campus session at different venues in Bariga (e.g. The Art Factory and Ilaje Bus Stop) where the artistic practices are generated and rooted in.

This workshop is part of the [“Youth on the Move: Performing Urban Space in the Global South”](#) Project, sponsored by Urban Studies Foundation Seminar Series Award. In order to help the participants travel between the different venues, we will hire a danfo during the conference to facilitate these “movements.”

What happens to the knowledge that's produced when research projects are transnational - being funded by a foreign organisation or bringing together researchers from West Africa and the "Global North"? Interrogating the case of IFRA-Nigeria, which has been working in Nigeria for more than 30 years, and bringing together perspectives from other collaborative projects that took place in the last years, this roundtable aims at critically engage the dynamics of collaborations, the injunctions from funding bodies to 'participation' and 'co-construction' but also the challenges of these kinds of projects with reference to gender, age, race or postcolonial relations of researchers. Amidst intense discussions on the decolonization of knowledge and epistemologies, and building on already strong conversations on the inequalities and dynamics of domination, we are looking to interrogate (how) North/South transnational research projects are still relevant and how to develop alternative ways of collaboration.

Last year, the LSA continued its tradition of investing in the career of up-and-coming scholars with a journal publishing workshop featuring editors from the *Journal of the African Literature Association*, *Second Order: An African Journal of Philosophy*, *African Studies Review*, *African Affairs*, and the *Journal of African History*. This year, we welcome editors from the thematic fields of politics, literature, history, philosophy, and African studies, broadly defined.

One of the biggest debates in African knowledge production is what constitutes a good journal manuscript. This debate is exacerbated by the expanding gap in resources and professional development opportunities for scholars, especially Africa-based junior academics. Vanity journals and book publishers are exploiting this crisis by publishing poorly researched and written works in exchange for cash, academic patronage, or predatory mentorship. This roundtable is designed to help prospective authors with core information about quality research and writing, determining where to send manuscripts, and the entire peer-review process.

The women's mentoring network of the Lagos Studies Association was founded to address the ongoing gender imbalances in academia. During the inaugural sessions in 2019, some of the leading women scholars of and from Nigeria narrated their own journeys in academia and created for us an archive of past experiences. Each generation of female scholars face new challenges and must respond to these while also continuing to be research active. The senior scholars in the program serve as role models for the graduate students as they develop competent skills for a sustainable productive academic life.

In addition to meeting with individual mentees, the mentors had two successful interactive sessions with Nigeria-based women scholars at LSA 2019 and organized two highly successful webinars on sexual harassment in higher education in October 2020. LSA 2021 and 2022 also featured general session of the mentors.

In this 2023 session of the LSA Women's Mentoring Program, each mentor will address what we call "Professional Literacy and Academic Citizenship." Each mentor may select one or more topics to address. The intention is to make explicit and to theorize what is required of us in professional settings, rather than to draw on experiential narratives.

What institutional knowledge can empower me to present myself professionally?

What are common mistakes women make that undermine our professionalism?

How does one say no to tasks that are assigned to you just because you are female (for example making tea in the staff room)?

How do I navigate different culturally coded settings (for example, how does one express respect in different kinds of rooms and environments)?

How can I build support networks with other female scholars, where we set time aside for intellectual labor?

How can I present myself as a professional, and still be fashionable?

If I am in a co-parenting situation, how can I negotiate to have research time?

How do I balance being approachable with being professional?

How can senior female scholars hold the door open for the next generation?

British authorities covertly removed thousands of documents from colonized territories around the time they won their independence from the 1940s through to the 1980s. These files include 413

taken from Nigeria. The so-called “migrated” archives were made available to researchers at the National Archives in London from 2012 to 2013, but British authorities have still not returned the documents to their countries of origin. As a result, it is challenging for many Nigeria-based researchers to use the ‘migrated’ archives.

This session will:

- Offer an introduction to the history of the stolen colonial archives, focusing particularly on the files removed from Nigeria.
- Give the opportunity to work with copies of some of the documents removed from Nigeria.
- Introduce a mentorship scheme open to up to six Nigeria-based early career researchers (ECRs), which will make available digital images of stolen documents relevant to their research, together with mentorship from an established researcher. The scheme will also cover the costs of successful applicants’ attendance at the 2024 LSA conference to present their research using the ‘migrated’ archives.

The women's mentoring network of the Lagos Studies Association was founded to address the ongoing gender imbalances in academia. During the inaugural sessions in 2019, some of the leading women scholars of and from Nigeria narrated their own journeys in academia and created for us an archive of past experiences. Each generation of female scholars face new challenges and must respond to these while also continuing to be research active. The senior scholars in the program serve as role models for the graduate students as they develop competent skills for a sustainable productive academic life.

In addition to meeting with individual mentees, the mentors had two successful interactive sessions with Nigeria-based women scholars at LSA 2019 and organized two highly successful webinars on sexual harassment in higher education in October 2020. LSA 2021 and 2022 also featured general session of the mentors.

In this 2023 session of the LSA Women's Mentoring Program, each mentor will address what we call "Professional Literacy and Academic Citizenship." Each mentor may select one or more topics to address. The intention is to make explicit and to theorize what is required of us in professional settings, rather than to draw on experiential narratives.

What institutional knowledge can empower me to present myself professionally?
What are common mistakes women make that undermine our professionalism?
How does one say no to tasks that are assigned to you just because you are female (for example making tea in the staff room)?
How do I navigate different culturally coded settings (for example, how does one express respect in different kinds of rooms and environments)?
How can I build support networks with other female scholars, where we set time aside for intellectual labor?
How can I present myself as a professional, and still be fashionable?
If I am in a co-parenting situation, how can I negotiate to have research time?
How do I balance being approachable with being professional?
How can senior female scholars hold the door open for the next generation?
